Joining our School

Admission Arrangements

The Department of Education has an enrolment policy. Students who live in zone are automatically accepted at Ladysmith Public School. Students who do not live in zone will be considered for enrolment by the principal. Parents and carers of children seeking to join the school should contact the school for an enrolment form before the end of Term 3. Transition starts in Week 6, Term 4.

Starting school for the first time

Starting school is a very important time for you, your child and the school. We all need to work together to make the transition smooth and rewarding.



Transition Program

Pupils with additional needs may have extra visits before starting school and there will be close liaison with parents to ensure that the correct arrangements are in place.

In the term prior to their entry, students are invited into school for visits. This will help them become familiar with the surroundings and routines of school. During this period, there will be meetings with parents to discuss our partnership with you and talk about any concerns you might have. Five transition sessions will be offered

- Friday 3rd November 2017 -9.00am-1.30pm
- Friday 10th November 2017-9.00am-1.30pm
- Friday 17th November 2017-9.00am-3.10pm
- Friday 24th November 2017-9.00am-3.10pm
- Friday 1st December 2017 -9.00am-3.10pm

Students will be admitted to Ladysmith Public School in the January. Children must attend school when they are 6 years old, and must have turned at least 5 by the 30th June the year they start school. It is important to discuss your child's readiness with the classroom teacher.

Moving On—Transitioning to High School

At the end of primary school, children transfer to high school and Wagga Wagga High School is our local High School. We have strong links with Wagga Wagga High School through the curriculum and community events. Our Year 6 students attend an Orientation process at the end of the year.



Transition to school is a new and exciting experience for parents, too. Parents are welcome to be involved with their child's transition to school.

If you or your child is experiencing any anxiety during this process, please discuss the situation with their teacher.

Specialist Tuition

Ladysmith Public School also provides a variety of extra curricular programs to extend students' learning and cater for individual's needs.

Each week, specialised music lessons are provided for all students who wish to attend. These are followed by band. Students are invited to attend Wagga Wagga band camps and choirs.

Students participate in Sustainability sessions which incorporate the vegetable garden, chicken coop, greenhouse, lizard sanctuary and frog ponds. Year 5 students participate in leadership and peer support programs which build their capacity as leaders for the future.

Environmental programs, such as Enviro Champs and Clever Climate Energy, provide opportunities to develop an understanding of the world around us.

Public Speaking and Debating programs develop self esteem and self confidence in all students. These are provided each year for all students.




At Ladysmith Public School we believe that every child can learn, and we explicitly teach our students amazing learning habits that will help them at school and in daily life.

Curriculum

English

The K-2 English syllabus covers 5 outcomes for student achievement. Objective A communicate through speaking, listening, reading, writing, viewing and representing; Objective B—Use language to shape and make meaning according to purpose, audience and context; Objective C—Think in ways that are imaginative, creative, interpretive and critical; Objective D—Express themselves and their relationships with others and their world; and Objective E—Learn and reflect on their learning through their study of English

Mathematics

The Mathematical syllabus for the Australian Curriculum develops students' ability to work mathematically through 3 broad strands of maths: Number and Algebra; Measurement and Geometry; and Statistics and Probability. Skills such as communicating, problem solving, reasoning, understanding and fluency with maths, help develop a holistic understanding.

• English and Mathematics are our core business everyday at Ladysmith Public School.



History, Geography, Science and Technology

The NSW Board of Studies Science, History and Geography syllabuses for the Australian Curriculum will develop students' ability to work scientifically and technologically. We aim to foster students' sense of wonder and expand their natural curiosity about the world around them in order to develop their understanding of, interest in, and enthusiasm for science, technology, history and geography. We shall develop their competence and creativity to appreciate and understand the Natural Environment and Made Environment—past, present and what the future will hold.



Personal Development, Health and Physical Education

The NSW Board of Studies, PD/H/PE syllabus covers Games & Sport; Gymnastics; Dance; Active Lifestyle; Personal Health Choices; Safe Living; Interpersonal Relationships; and Growth and Development. These areas are taught in weekly lessons that are taught in stage groups, fitness lessons and sport. At Ladysmith Public School, we have all our PD/H/PE sessions on Wednesday, plus fitness sessions each day.

Creative and Practical Arts

The NSW Board of Studies CAPA syllabus covers Music; Dance; Drama and Visual Arts. At Ladysmith Public School, we have individual music lessons on Wednesdays. These are run by Ramos Music. Dance and Music are also an intricate part of the Presentation Night production. CAPA is covered on Fridays with art, drama, dance and choir.

Parents in Partnership



We welcome parents and carers into Ladysmith Public School, believing we are partners in the education of your children. There are many opportunities for parents to become involved in the life of the school and to gain a greater understanding of its work. Parents' support and expertise can be used in many ways and is greatly valued, remembering all volunteers are required to have a Working With Children Check completed.

We believe in letting parents and carers know what and how we are learning.

We encourage two-way dialogue between school and home and support this through Parent Information Evenings, interviews, P&C meetings, newsletters and invitations to many of our assemblies. The school's website has a wealth of information, including our weekly newsletter and P&C page. Newsletters are published weekly and go home each Tuesday

Our Parents and Citizens Association are very busy and include mums, dads, grandparents and other local people who care about our school.

Our Community

Our school is at the centre of our community. Many local businesses and people give us their support and are always very generous when we fundraise for school resources.

We also visit people outside school and take part in community activities such as ANZAC Day ceremonies, Clean Up Australia Day, Education Week, Grandparents Assembly and Bike Days. Parents often drop by the school and help out with reading groups, science or art activities, and to join our assemblies. With parental involvement, research shows, students grow and learn at a more rapid rate on a yearly basis. Assemblies are held regularly and parents are always welcome. These include special assemblies such as Grandparent assemblies, Daffodil day assemblies and Harmony Day.

Links with other Schools

We enjoy strong links with the Wagga Wagga Small Schools network and our local high school, Wagga Wagga High School.

Each term we participate in joint activities with the Small Schools network. These include sporting events like touch football days, athletics carnivals, cross country and swimming carnivals. We also participate in curriculum days such as working with authors on how to be writers, debating championships, public speaking competitions, and superhero days where we share ideas and learning.



School Uniform

School uniforms reflect the school ethos and values. Our uniforms are practical and comfortable. All students are encouraged to wear school uniforms every day. Sports uniforms are worn on Wednesday. Our Sun Safe Policy ensures hats are worn in Terms 1 and 4.

Bus Zone

The school bus zone is in Tywong Street, east of the main entrance to the school.

Visitors in and around the school

All parents and visitors must attend the front office on arrival. All visitors to the school must sign in and out in the visitor's book. This is an WH & S requirement.

Home Learning

Home learning is a purposeful learning experience which may consolidate, extend and or enrich the school's educational program. All students will be provided with some form of learning to be completed at home.



Library

Library borrowing is conducted by classroom teachers. Students have the opportunity to borrow from the Riverina Regional Library when the mobile library van visits Ladysmith every second week.

Scripture

Scripture classes are conducted each Wednesday afternoon between 1.45pm and 3.10pm by Mr Damian Cox (non-denominational) and Father Luke Joseph (Catholic).

Absences

It is vital that your child doesn't miss any days of school. If your child is unwell or there is another reason they cannot attend school, you must supply the classroom teacher with an absent note within 2 days that explains their absence.

- A note which can be completed can be found on our school website or you can send in an absentee note via the school APP.
- Family holidays Please obtain the Principal's approval before leaving.

Other Information

Collectables and items brought and worn to school

Our school policy says students are not to wear nail polish, inappropriate jewellery, makeup or out of uniform clothes to school. Students will be asked to remove any of these items if worn to school. The policy also states that electronic devices, phones or games are not to be brought to school. Students who bring any such items to school will be asked to place them in the office for the day.

Lost Property

Naming all items reduces the risk of your child losing property. Please label jumpers, hats, drink bottles, lunch boxes and anything else your child brings to school.

Leadership Lunch Orders

Our leaders provide lunch orders twice a week. On leadership lunch days we do not take orders to the Ladysmith Shop. On other days students may order a healthy lunch from the shop.

Fruit Break—Crunch and Sip

All students have fruit break. Students are encouraged to bring fruit in recyclable containers. Students are also encouraged to drink water at this time. All students should have a drink bottle which they can have in class with them if they need a drink.

Infectious Diseases

There are a number of common childhood illnesses which children may contract that require a short exclusion from school. Following, is a list of the more common illnesses and the period for which the child must be kept home.

- Measles 5 days
- Chicken Pox
- Mumps 10 days
- Impetigo (school sores) may attend school as long as the sore is covered
