

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Learning with Mrs Flinn

How is it week 6 already!

Over the last 2 weeks we have been focussing on completing some writing and maths assessment tasks.

The students have been working really hard to complete all their tasks and should be proud of all of their efforts.

This week we looked at a book called 'The All New Orange 430'. We read the book multiple times, and followed with a discussion of some of the ideas and topics which were raised. This week our discussion centred around the useless objects we purchase and are convinced to spend our money on through advertising and marketing campaigns, often by big companies. There was some fantastic in-depth discussion. Hopefully we may consider some of these ideas the next time we read a catalogue or see a toy advertised on television.

We have been lucky enough to be working with Mr Schultz to design and print some creations using the 3D printers. We have the printers for 2 more weeks, during which time, hopefully everyone will get a chance to see their design come to life. So far quite a few students have successfully printed their designs.

In the last 2 weeks students have also been introduced to the story of Christian the Lion. Christian was a lion cub who was purchased by two Australian travellers from a department store 'Harrods' in London. After housing him in their flat for 1 year and exercising him in the yard of a nearby church, the men had no choice but to release the lion into it's natural habitat in Africa. One year after his release, the men visited the lion in Africa after a local guide tracked the lion for them. Christian was now the head of a pride in Africa, with a wife and family of his own.

However, when he saw the two men he ran to them and hugged them, remembering them and has and the relationship they had shared! We watched some footage of the 2 men and Christian being reunited - it was incredible! We discussed and wrote down our ideas regarding whether or not the two men purchasing the lion and housing him in their flat was an ethical decision or not. We even emailed an ABC podcast, 'Short and Curly' about it and they replied to us (which we were very excited about)! The students had quite a heated discussion regarding the ethics of many aspects of the situation, which evolved into a discussion regarding humans and whether we live naturally or not. Mrs Chapman was able to share some insights into how much life has changed since she was young. We came to the conclusion that although hardly any humans live in what would be considered a 'natural' way we do have many opportunites that wouldn't exist without technology and modern conveniences!

We have a busy few weeks coming up as we head towards the end of the term - both within and outside the classroom. We are looking forward to seeing out the school year with some fun and some learning!



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Important school zone signs



No Parking

Stop here for up to two minutes to drop off and pick up passengers. You must stay within three metres of your vehicle at all times. No parking zones provide a safe place to drop off or pick up children.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$191 + 2 demerit points



No Stopping

Do no stop here for any reason. No stopping zones keep sight lines clear for drivers and children. Drivers also must not stop at the side of a road marked with a continuous yellow line, this line means the same as no stopping.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 + 2 demerit points



Bus Zone

Can only be used if driving a bus. A Bus Zone allows buses to drop off and pick up passengers safely.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 + 2 demerit points



Children Crossing

Orange children crossing flags and hand-held stop signs must be obeyed.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$572 + 4 demerit points for stopping on or near children's crossing



Speeding

Speeding increases the chance of a crash resulting in severe trauma and injury. It's not worth the risk.

Min penalty exceeds \$481 + 2 demerit points MAX PENALTY \$3895 + 7 demerit points



Running a red light

You have run a red light if your vehicle crosses the white stop line after the lights turn red. PENALTY EXCEEDS \$572 + 4 demerit points

We all have a responsibility to keep each other safe.

Road safety is a shared responsibility. Keep children safe by following the road rules, particularly in school zones. Traffic rules and parking restrictions are there to improve safety around schools. We all have a role to play in keeping children safe. Next time you are in a school zone here are some simple tips to follow:


- Waiting in the no stopping zone is illegal and unsafe
- It's illegal and unsafe to stop on a children's crossing – even to let children out of a car
- Don't queue for a spot. Drive around the block if you can't find a park
- U-turns, three-point turns are dangerous, and it's safest to avoid reverse parking outside a school
- Drop off and pick up children on the school-side of the road
- ▶ The safest door on a car is the kerbside rear door
- > Stay buckled up until the vehicle has stopped
- No mobile phones
- You must not stop or park in a bus zone for any reason (including queuing or waiting for a space) unless you are driving a bus. If times are shown on the sign, you are not allowed to stop during those times





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
Common parking rules



Stopping in a bus zone

You must not stop or park in a bus zone unless you are driving a bus.


PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 + 2 demerit points



Parking across driveways and footpaths


Don't stop across a driveway or footpath in a school zone, not even to drop off or pick up students.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 +2 demerit points



Stopping in intersections


Don't stop within 10 metres of an intersection. **PENALTY EXCEEDS \$457 + 2 demerit points**



Parking near pedestrian crossing

You must not stop on or within 20 meters before a pedestrian crossing or 10 meters after a pedestrian crossing.


PENALTY EXCEEDS \$457 + 2 demerit points



Double parking

Don't stop on a road between the centre of the road and another vehicle that is parked at the side of the road, to wait or pick up or drop off passengers.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 +2 demerit points



U-Turns

You can be penalised for dangerous U-turns in a school zone.

PENALTY EXCEEDS \$344 +2 demerit points
